YEAR 7 AND 9 NAPLAN TESTING - WEEK 4

Students in Year 7 and 9 will participate in NAPLAN testing during Week 4 on Tuesday 11 May, Wednesday 12 May and Thursday 13 May. Students will complete 4 tests across the 3 days that cover; Language Convention, Writing, Reading and Numeracy.

YEAR 9 NAPLAN CERTIFICATES OF ACHIEVEMENT

A new feature of the NAPLAN assessment is being launched this year, with the award of Year 9 Certificates of Achievement.

The new certificates aim to celebrate and recognise the importance of both excellence and learning growth.

Beginning in 2021, Year 9 students who achieve outstanding results or who significantly improve their results in NAPLAN tests will receive a NAPLAN Certificate of Achievement.

The certificates will be awarded for two categories of achievement:

- Category one: the achievement of excellence through getting a result in the top band for reading or numeracy, or both.
- Category two: the achievement of outstanding learning growth through improve by two or more bands between the NAPLAN Year 7 and Year 9 tests for reading or numeracy, or both.

ATTITUDES TO SCHOOL SURVEY

The Attitudes to School survey is an annual survey for Years 5 to 12 students conducted by the Department of Education and Training. It is designed to assist schools in gaining an understanding of students' perceptions and experience of school. Our school will use the survey results to plan programs and activities to improve your child's experience at school.

Students in Years 7 to 12 will participate in this year's survey. All responses to the survey are anonymous. This year the Attitudes to School survey will be conducted at our school later this term. The survey only takes 20-30 minutes to complete and occurs during your child's class time.

The survey results will be reported back to the school later in the year. Last year we used the survey results to further consult with students via a range of forums. The feedback has now been incorporated into the strategic plan goals across the areas of achievement, engagement and wellbeing.

LAPTOPS

Students need to bring a charged laptop or similar device to school every day and should get used to taking them home each night to complete work on and recharge. If a students does not bring a charged laptop to school, they will be very disadvantaged and may have to complete some of the work using paper and pen. As much of the work is now on Google Classroom so that students can access it at any time, having a laptop is an essential item for learning.

MPSC UNIFORM

There is no separate summer or winter uniform and students can wear items from the uniform list that suit the weather. This includes the school trousers/pants, shorts, dress or skirt, white shirt, woollen jumper or jacket and black leather school shoes. There is also a PE/Sport uniform for the days when students have sport.

Students may wear a short sleeved garment such as a T-shirt under their school shirt for extra warmth but should not be wearing anything that is visibly not school uniform. This includes a hoody or long sleeves of a skivvy if only wearing a shirt. Most Year 12 students now have their Year 12 jackets and wear these every day. Uniform can be purchased from PSW in South Morang.

HOMEWORK CLUB AND AFTER SCHOOL TUTORING

Homework club runs every Thursday afternoon in the Senior Campus Library from 3:05. Food is provided and there are many staff that go in to help students at this time. The library is also open every Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday until 4:30pm for students to do private study.

We now also have tutoring afterschool every Monday in the multi purpose room, next to the canteen. This runs from 3:05 until 4:30pm and also has food for those that complete an hour of work. Tutors are on hand to support students at this time. Last Monday 26th April was the first day of after school tutoring and approximately 25 students attended! Great to see so many students taking advantage of this resource.

Her two years were "a constant balancing act between university and school commitments", but she felt supported by her school mentor and fellow TFA associates.

Victorian Chief Health Officer message

Victorian Chief Health Officer message to Victorian schools and their communities



I would like to take this opportunity to thank students, staff, teachers, parents and carers for ensuring a safe and successful start to the 2021 school year and to thank you

for your cooperation during the short period of remote learning in February during the circuit breaker restrictions.

As Term 2 commences, schools continue to be able to operate with a largely normal program of activity, enabling important on-site activities to return, such as school open days and working bees, with appropriate health and safety measures in place.

Throughout the pandemic, Victorian schools have rapidly and successfully adapted to reduce the risk of COVID-19 transmission, embedding COVIDSafe principles by reinforcing good behaviours, creating safe spaces, adapting activities, and responding quickly to COVID-19 risk.

While we have seen outbreaks emerge in Victoria, we have also witnessed our capacity to respond quickly to limit the impact of these outbreaks.

Given the current very low risk of COVID-19 transmission in the community, continued high rates of testing and wastewater monitoring, and continued observance of health and safety measures in schools; those with medical vulnerabilities or their carers can feel reassured to continue to safely work and learn on school sites, and enjoy the benefits of doing so.

It is crucial, however, for everyone to remain vigilant by staying home when unwell, performing regular hand hygiene, wearing a mask when required and maintaining physical distancing from others when practical.

Should cases of COVID-19 increase again in the community, I am confident that with COVIDSafe plans in place, alongside our ability to quickly identify and respond to cases, schools remain safe places for all staff and students. I also continue to be reassured by evidence that children are less impacted by the virus and are less likely to develop severe illness.

The school community continues to have an important role to promote COVID-19 testing when a student or staff member has any symptoms, no matter how mild, and ensuring they remain home until they are well. Getting tested and staying home until results are known is critical to limiting community transmission.

Aspire – Early Admissions Program to La Trobe

The <u>Aspire program</u> rewards the skills and knowledge students gain from the positive impact they have made on their school or community through *community service* or *volunteerism*. Designed to give Year 12's the tools they need to succeed at La Trobe and beyond, students accepted into the Aspire program will get:

- A taste of university life at La Trobe with special on-campus events before the year commences
- The chance to meet and connect with like-minded students
- · Leadership opportunities, career development, networking, and industry mentoring
- VCE revision lectures for Year 12's in the September school holidays
- Access to La Trobe's extensive library and campus resources
- Induction into La Trobe's Enrichment Program to prepare for what is to come

Successful applicants also receive their *early conditional offer* in September for their chosen course along with minimum ATAR requirements. Many courses have a minimum ATAR of 55.00, but some professional degree programs have higher requirements.

Up to 40 <u>Aspire scholarships</u>, worth \$5,000 per year for up to four years, will be awarded to leading eligible Aspire students.

The Minimum ATAR Table shows the minimum ATAR for some professional degree courses for entry through Aspire in 2022. Should an applicant's preferred course not be listed on this table, then the minimum ATAR is 50.00.

La Trobe University will be at Mill Park Secondary College on Thursday 6 May to give a presentation and answer questions about Aspire. This is a lunch-time session from 1pm.





Works Notification

Out of hours works on the Mernda line Epping to South Morang

From Monday 17 May to Friday 27 August 2021

Testing of next-generation High Capacity Signalling for the Metro Tunnel is continuing on the Mernda line.

Please read the information in this notification to familiarise yourself with the impacts of the works, including planned closures of the Mernda line.

Out of hours works will continue intermittently on the Mernda line from May to August to allow the Metro Tunnel Project to conduct critical testing of High Capacity Signalling technology.

These works will also include relocation of an existing signal mast and associated trackside equipment near Pindari Avenue in May 2021.

What we are doing

- Testing trackside and train equipment
- Testing new signalling technology
- Relocating trackside and signalling equipment
- Works will require the use of an excavator, hand-held power tools, lighting tower, light vehicles and trains that will be testing the new technology on the track.

What to be aware of

- These works are expected to generate medium to high levels of noise
- During the May works at Pindari Avenue, the shared user path that runs alongside the rail corridor between Epping and South Morang station will remain open for use. However, traffic management will be in place during this period to enable safe movements of light vehicles that will be accessing the path to enter the rail corridor
- Testing works will require the use of trains at night, when trains are not normally running. The trains will use horns as required.

Travel changes

- To ensure these works can take place safely, buses replace trains on various evenings from 8.50pm to last service between Epping and Mernda from 17 May to 27 August 2021
- Passengers should allow extra travel time.
