# **Pastoral Teacher**

# Get started with Compass



# Compass is a web-based system, which allows you to access up-to-date and meaningful information about our school and your child's progress.

- Monitor your child's attendance, and enter an explanation for absence or lateness
- Communicate with your child's teachers, and update your family contact details
- View your child's timetable and the school calendar
- Monitor your child's homework and assessment tasks
- Download and view your child's academic reports
- Book parent-teacher conferences
- Pay and provide consent for events and school fees

Our school will advise parents when each of these features becomes available for parent use.



#### 1. Download the app

# MPSC Uniform Requirements 2023

MPSC is a compulsory uniform school.

The intention of the uniform is so that all students can feel like a member of Mill Park Secondary College and represent the school with pride. Students are able to select the items (standard uniform or PE uniform) that best suits their activities on any given day.

There is a standard uniform and a Physical Education (PE) sport uniform. Students may wear either the standard or the PE uniform, depending on their preference and the activities that they have on that day.

Hoodies and leggings are not part of the uniform and are not to be worn at any time.

If parents/students need assistance with supplying uniform, please contact your Campus Principal.

#### Standard Uniform

- School trousers/pants, shorts, dress or skirt, with MPSC logo.
- White MPSC shirt when wearing the school trousers/pants, shorts or skirt, with MPSC logo.
- MPSC jumper or jacket or both, with school logo.
- White socks can be worn with the summer dress, shorts, or PE shorts. Navy blue tights or white socks can be worn with the winter skirt. Any colour sock may be worn under long pants, including the PE/Sport track pants.
- Students may wear a plain white garment such as a T-shirt or skivvy under their school shirt for extra warmth.

### **PE/Sport** Uniform

- •PE uniform is the PE polo, track pants or shorts, college jumper or jacket, each with the school logo. PE uniform can be worn on any day, irrespective of whether the student has a PE class or not. A mixture of PE and standard uniform cannot be worn at the same time.
- Special Uniform Items Year 12 students may purchase and wear the official Year 12 Class Jacket of their Graduating Year.
- Headwear students are encouraged to wear a hat outside. Hats are not to be worn inside.
   Religious head wear is required to be navy blue or white in line with the rest of the college uniform.

### **Recommended School Bag**

# **College Diary**

At this time of year, families will start thinking about the next school year in terms of uniform, books, and stationery. A student diary is an important way of building students' skill levels in relation to organisation and time management. All students must have the school diary and take it with them to EVERY class.

The MPSC Student Diary is a paper diary. Research has shown that writing entries into a diary commits tasks to the brain, which is especially important for adolescents. The Student Diary includes key information about the school like, bell times, maps of the school, policies, as well as rules around uniform, lateness, and attendance.

The 2023 diary will contain a considerable amount of information on student engagement and the MPSC Student Engagement Model. This model will be a key feature of the 2023 Pastoral Program across Years

7-12; thus, the diary will be used like a textbook for classes. Staff will have the teacher version of this diary which supports the Student

Engagement Model and its implementation in 2023.

### Lockers

Students will be allocated a locker. Students are encouraged to buy the Mill Park Secondary College Padlock if this was not previously purchased in Years 7-9 or if the student is new to the College.

# Structure of the day at Senior Campus

At the Senior Campus, Year 10 students will be allocated to a specific Homegroup (e.g., 10A) and this will form their Pastoral Class for the entire year. Pastoral runs every Friday during session 5.

School arrival time should be between **8:40-8:50am**. Students arriving to school after 8:50am risk arriving late to Period 1. During the first morning locker bell, students are expected to go to their lockers and collect the appropriate equipment/materials for Periods 1 and 2 and proceed directly to class.

When students have two single sessions (every Monday during sessions 3 and 4 and Friday during sessions 5 and 6), they must collect the appropriate equipment/materials for **both** sessions. Students are not permitted to stop at their lockers between singles and must head directly to their next class once dismissed.

# Secondary School Attendance

# **EVERY DAY COUNTS**

Going to school every day is the single most important part of your teenager's education.

Students learn new things at school every day – missing school puts them behind.

#### Attendance

Families will be notified by SMS when their son/ daughter is absent for part of the day or for the whole day. Students are expected to maintain a minimum 90% attendance throughout the year. Absences over 10% of the school year could jeopardise success at school and can lead to an unsatisfactory result in VCE studies in Years 11 and 12. It is important for Year 10 students to build up effective habits around attendance.

Following an absence, a note or Medical Certificate must be provided to the General Office within five days of the absence, or otherwise the absence will be 'unapproved'.

**Approved** reasons for absence include:

- Illness
- Medical/dental appointment
- Court appointment
- Funeral
- Job interview
- Driver's license test

Unapproved reasons for absence include:

- Birthdays
- Learner's Permit Test
- Driving lessons
- Part-time work
- Supporting upset friends
- Sleeping in
- Missed the bus
- Car trouble
- Holidays
- Unspecified 'personal' reasons

### Leaving early

Students who need to leave school early must bring a signed note from a parent/guardian and present this to the General Office, where they must sign out before leaving the school grounds. Parents/guardians may also contact the General Office in advance to sign a student out directly, rather than writing a note.

#### Lateness

Students who arrive late to school at the Senior Campus must go to the General Office and sign in on the Ping Machine and get a late pass then go straight to class. Students with a note or medical certificate need to present them to the General Office and will be issued with an 'approved' late pass. Students who arrive late without a note or medical will certificate be marked as an 'unapproved' late.

#### Feeling unwell

If students are feeling unwell or have had an accident/injury during the school day, they should notify the classroom teacher or teacher on yard duty and go to the General Office. The office staff are first aid trained and can attend to students.

Depending on the nature of your illness/injury, parents may be contacted to arrange for students to go home. Whilst waiting for parents, students may rest in the sick bay.



# Travelling to and from school safely

#### Catching the Bus

There are two bus routes that include a bus stop directly outside the school (Civic Drive) throughout the day:

• **577** (Reservoir Buses) – South Morang Station to Epping Plaza via Findon Road

• **573** (Dysons) – Bundoora RMIT to Mill Park Lakes Other buses stop at the South Morang railway station or Westfield Shopping Centre, only a short walk from the Senior Campus.

For bus timetables, go to:

#### Mill Park:

For students that live near Plenty Road, the **386** and **387** buses travel **directly** to the Senior Campus. The **383** bus travels through Uni Hill, Blossom Park and Centenary Drive, and will stop at the Senior Campus during school times. The **564** and **382** buses will continue to operate through Mill Park and finish at South Morang Station.

#### Bundoora:

The **383** starts at Uni Hill and stops at the Senior Campus during school times. The **382** bus service travels up Plenty Road and through Mill Park and finishes at South Morang Station.

The Lakes / The Pallisades / South Morang:

The 383 Pallisades bus runs from The Pallisades, through The Lakes and stops at the Senior Campus during school times. The 386 and 387 buses run at high frequencies down Lakes Boulevard and stop at the Senior Campus.

#### Mernda:

The **387** travels through Mernda Villages Drive, Breadalbane Avenue, into the Hawkstowe Estate, through The Lakes direct to the Senior Campus. The **382** and **381** travel down Plenty Road to South Morang Station.

#### Doreen:

The **381** bus travels north on Yan Yean Road, through Flaxen Hills Road and Overland Drive down to Bridge Inn Road, before proceeding down Plenty Road to South Morang Station. The **382** down Plenty Road to South Morang Station may also assist Doreen residents. http://dysongroup.com.au/public-transport/metro

The 386, 387 and 383 buses all now stop at the Senior Campus in the morning and leave from the Senior Campus at the end of the school day. The times and frequencies of these services match our school bell times and are designed to support our school communities transport needs. We encourage families to use these bus services.

#### Walking or Cycling

Students walking to or from school must use pedestrian crossings. Students riding their bicycle or skateboard to or from school must wear a bike/skating helmet and can store their bicycle in the bike rack near Block 5 or their skateboard in their locker. Students are not permitted to ride their bicycle or skateboard on school grounds. Students are ambassadors for the College and should always model our school values when at school and travelling to and from school.

#### Driving - student drivers and passengers

Students who are old enough to drive and have a car are able to park in the student designated **CAR PARK 3** (on Findon Road), Student drivers must follow all lawful driving regulations, including limits on carrying passengers. Student drivers **MUST** register their personal and vehicle details with the General Office **BEFORE** parking their car in the car park. Any passengers must also register with the General Office by completing the 'passenger' permission form, which requires a parent signature.

Student drivers and passengers will be issued with a laminated pass, which they must produce when requested by any member of staff.

### Student Leadership

All students from Years 10, 11 and 12 are invited to join the Student Leadership Team in 2023. The Senior Campus has a number of leadership opportunities available to all students.

The Student Leadership Team plays an integral role in representing the student cohort across the College. Captains are usually involved in leadership development programs, lead school and community-based initiatives, represent the College at events, and assist staff members on Information/Open Nights and Parent-Teacher Interviews.

Positions are usually advertised at the beginning of Term 4 in preparation from the following year. If any student is interested in joining the Student Leadership Team for 2023, they should speak directly to their respective Year Level Coordinator.

#### **MPSC Houses**

Students from the Middle Years Campus will already be allocated to a house. Pastoral teachers will inform new students of their house early in Term 1.

#### VCE Centre for Excellence -

The Study Centre is located next to the canteen and is managed by Mrs. Carissa Strangis.

The Year 12 Common Room is next to the coordinators offices and is equipped with computers for **schoolwork only**. It is a place where mostly Year 12 students go for their timetabled study session. Students must take homework or revision material and use their time effectively in the Study Centre – either **silent study, or quiet group study**.

# Breakfast Club

The Breakfast Club operates every Friday morning from 8.00am until the first bell to begin the school day. All students are invited to enjoy a **free** breakfast of pancakes, fruit, toast, juice, or hot chocolate. They have the best, fluffiest pancakes in town and the most delicious hot chocolate to wash it down! Remember, you cannot drive a car without petrol and the same goes with your body and mind! Breakfast Club is located near Block 2.

### Computers - internet and printing

Access to the school network will be organized during Step Up or in your first week of Term 1. If you have any problems logging on or accessing the network, you will need to see the IT technicians located in the library.

Students from the Middle Years Campus can use the same username and password. If you are new to the College, you will need to visit the IT technicians to set up your username and password. Internet access is free for all schoolwork; however, students must abide by the Network and Internet Acceptable Use Policy. All students receive printing credit at the start of each term. Once this is used up, students will need to purchase more printing credit. This can be paid for at the General Office, where students will receive a receipt with a passcode to be entered when next printing work.

### Library and Homework Club

The Senior Campus Library is open before school, during recess and lunch times, and after school. Students must sign in/out at the front desk, when using the library during class time.

School bags, food, and drink are not permitted in the library at any time. Students will have an opportunity to tour the library early in Term 1 2023 to find out about all the library has to offer.

Homework Club runs **everyThursday after school until4pm, throughout the year**. Teachers are available to provide one-on-one assistance and support. Light afternoon tea is provided to students who attend.

#### Headstart program



Year 9 students who are commencing a Year 10 program at Mill Park Secondary College in 2023 are expected to attend and participate in Headstart.

This program consists of a mixture of assemblies, English, Mathematics and Science classes together with an introduction to next year's other semester one subjects.

These classes are **compulsory**. If students do not attend all classes as part of the Headstart program, it may jeopardise their start to 2023. # FREE INSTRUCTION

- Schools provide students with free instruction and ensure students have free access to all items, activities and services that are used by the school to fulfil the standard curriculum requirements in Victorian Curriculum F-10, VCE and VCAL.
- Schools may invite parents to make a financial contribution to support the school.

# **PARENT PAYMENT REQUESTS**

Schools can request contributions from parents under three categories:

#### **Curriculum Contributions**

Voluntary financial contributions for curriculum items and activities which the school deems necessary for students to learn the Curriculum. Other Contributions Voluntary financial contributions for noncurriculum items and activities that relate to the school's functions and objectives.

#### Extra-Curricular Items and Activities Items and activities that enhance or broaden the schooling experience of students and are above and beyond what the school provides for free to deliver the Curriculum. These are provided on a user-pays basis.

Schools may also invite parents to supply or purchase educational items to use and own (e.g. textbooks, stationery, digital devices).



### FINANCIAL HELP FOR FAMILIES

- Schools put in place financial hardship arrangements to support families who cannot pay for items or activities so that their child doesn't miss out.

# **CSEF Eligibility**

Below is the criteria used to determine a student's eligibility for the Camps, Sports and Excursions Fund (CSEF).

### **Criteria 1: Eligibility**

To be eligible\* for the fund, a parent or legal guardian of a student attending a registered Government or nongovernment Victorian primary or secondary school must:

- on the first day of Term one, **OR**;
- on the first day of Term two.
- a) Be an eligible beneficiary within the meaning of the State Concessions Act 2004, that is, be a holder of Veterans Affairs Gold Card or be an eligible Centrelink Health Care Card (HCC) or Pensioner Concession Card (PCC) holder, **OR**
- b) Be a temporary foster parent, and;
- c) Submit an application to the school by the due date.
- \* A special consideration eligibility category also exists. For more information, see: www.education.vic.gov.au/ about/programs/Pages/csef.aspx

Parents who receive a Carer Allowance on behalf of a child, or any other benefit or allowance not income tested by Centrelink, are not eligible for the CSEF unless they also comply with one of (a) or (b) above.

# Criteria 2: Be of school age and attend school in Victoria

School is compulsory for all Victorian children aged between six and 17 years of age inclusive.

For the purposes of CSEF, students may be eligible for assistance if they attend a Victorian registered primary or secondary school. Typically, these students are aged between five and 18 years inclusive.

CSEF is not payable to students attending pre-school, kindergarten, home schooled, or TAFE.

#### **Eligibility Date**

For concession card holders CSEF eligibility will be subject to the parent/legal guardian's concession card being successfully validated with Centrelink on the first day of either term one (30 January 2023) or term two (24 April 2023).

# **Payment Amounts**

#### **CSEF** payment amount

The CSEF is an annual payment to the school to be used towards camps, sports and/or excursion expenses for the benefit of the eligible student.

- Primary school student rate: \$125 per year.
- Secondary school student rate: \$225 per year.

The CSEF is paid directly to your child's school and will be allocated by the school towards camps, sports and/or excursion costs for your child.

For ungraded students, the rate payable is determined by the student's date of birth. For more information, see: www. education.vic.gov.au/about/programs/Pages/csef.aspx

Year 7 government school students who are CSEF recipients are also eligible for a uniform voucher. Secondary schools are required to make applications on behalf of parents so please register your interest at the school.

# How to complete the application form

#### Note: all sections must be completed by parent/legal guardian

 Complete the PARENT/LEGAL GUARDIAN DETAILS section. Make sure that the Surname, First Name, and Customer Reference Number (CRN) details match those on your concession card. You will also need to provide your concession card to the school.

If you are claiming as a Foster Parent or a Veteran Affairs Pensioner, you will need to provide a copy of documentation confirming your status as a temporary Foster Parent or provide your Veterans Affairs Pensioner Gold card to the school.

- Complete the STUDENT/S DETAILS section for students at this school.
- 3. Sign and date the form and return it to the school office as soon as possible. The CSEF program for 2023 closes on Friday 23 June 2023.

CSEF payments cannot be claimed retrospectively for prior years.

# Student responsibilities for devices and safe usage

All students are expected to bring a charged laptop to school every day.

All students and families are required to read MPSC Network and Internet Acceptable Use Policy which can be found in this pack or on the school website **here** 

# Do I need to go and buy a brand-new device?

Existing laptops may be used if they meet the minimum specifications.

# Where will laptops be stored during breaks?

All 7-12 students are provided with a locker. It is their responsibility to purchase a lock and ensure that it remains locked.

Are there any additional items to purchase?

MPSC encourages students to protect their device by storing in a dedicated laptop bag or pouch.

# Can students put their own software, music, apps or games etc. on their laptop?

Yes, the laptop belongs to you and you have full administrative control. However, if you have software or files on the device that breach the Acceptable User Agreement then we may restrict your internet access at school.

#### Is there any insurance?

Insurance is not compulsory and not provided by MPSC. It may be possible to include the laptop within your current Home Insurance policy.

# Can students charge their laptops at school?

As there are limited spaces for charging, students are expected to bring a fully charged laptop to school to ensure maximum use in the classroom.

# Will MPSC monitor internet usage at school?

DET provide a safe and secure Wi-Fi network. Some meta data may be recorded in this process.

# Can MPSC monitor laptops whilst at home?

No, we are unable to monitor usage of devices outside of the eduSTAR network.

#### Will MPSC install any software?

MPSC will need to install the Wireless certificate to allow access to the network and the Citrix Client to allow access to the software.

# Is the school assisting with devices repairs?

MPSC's involvement is limited to assisting students to access the network & software provided. We are unable to support students with repairs. A limited number of laptops are available to students, during the school day and for short periods of time when they are unable to access their own device due to damage.

# I am concerned about cyber bullying, safety and over usage

MPSC is mindful of that students need to become safe and socially responsible digital citizens. It has a range of supports for students to develop safe positive habits in their use of technology.
